SITUATION OVERVIEW

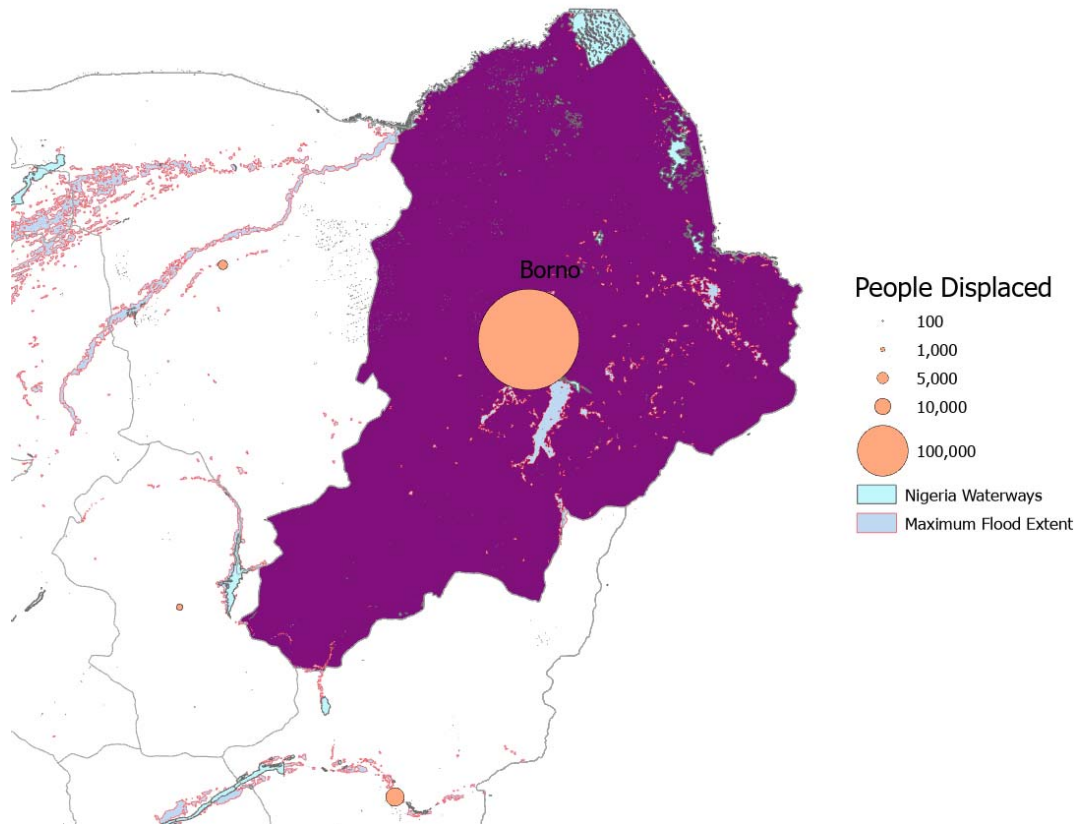
The Nigerian Meteorological Agency (NiMet) has forecasted an early onset of the rainy season in 2024 for Borno State.

The early rains have led to significant flooding, affecting approximately 142,000 individuals across seven Local Government Areas (LGAs).

Heavy downpours in August and September caused excessive inflow into the Alau Dam in Konduga LGA, surpassing its capacity. This resulted in the collapse of a section of the dam and subsequent widespread flooding in the Maiduguri Metropolitan Council and Jere LGA.

The flooding has led to displacement of numerous residents, destruction of infrastructure including houses, markets, farmlands, schools, hospitals, roads and bridges.

NEMA's Incident Management Teams are actively conducting assessments in affected areas. Search and Rescue Operations teams are deployed to assist those in immediate danger, Water Purification Systems trucks are set up to provide safe drinking water to impacted communities, Mobile Clinics with healthcare services are being delivered to address medical needs in flooded areas, there are ongoing Relief Distribution of essential supplies and wet feeding to affected populations.



The flood situation in Borno State has had a significant impact, affecting 414,176 people, with 389,267 displaced and 7,155 houses damaged across nine local government areas (LGAs).

Camp Report

NEMA, in collaboration with Borno SEMA and various stakeholders, has established 26 IDP camps in Maiduguri, accommodating 310,963 displaced individuals (54,260 households). The camps include:

Support and Coordination

Numerous partners are involved in camp coordination and management, including:

Food and non-food items are being distributed by NEMA, the state government, and other partners in most camps, with some still receiving wet feeding.

Efforts continue to provide assistance and support to those affected by this crisis.

Challenges

Despite plans to close some camps, internally displaced persons (IDPs) continue to face significant shortages in essential items, including:

- Food
- Non-food items (NFIs)
- Water
- Medicaments
- Hygiene kits
- Adequate shelter
- Toilet facilities
- Fumigation services
- Nutrition services

Activities

NEMA Operations

1. Evacuation

- The Emergency Response Team (ERT) has successfully rescued and evacuated over 400 individuals, with operations ongoing.

2. Medical Outreach

- The medical team (MICU) provided first aid and treatment to 171 individuals across various camps.

3. Water Supply

- The Agency's water tanker is supplying potable water around the clock to Fannami Gubio Camp, which is experiencing severe water shortages.
- Water purification trucks have arrived from headquarters and are ready to treat and recycle floodwaters in locations facing acute shortages.

4. Monitoring and Evaluation

- A high-level delegation from the United Nations visited Yerwa and other established camps in Maiduguri, accompanied by the ZC.
- The NEMA M&E team collaborated with Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) to establish a temporary health facility in Modu Fannami Camp.
- The NEMA M&E engaged GM BoSEPA to deploy sanitation teams to underserved camps, which was promptly addressed.
- In response to inadequate cooking materials, the NEMA M&E team coordinated with Civil Society Organizations to supply additional cooking pots and utensils.
- The team visited newly established Bulabulin Ngarnam and Zajeri Camps, where they identified the need for government presence and initiated the deployment of staff to support the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) structure.
- Basic medical support (medicaments) was delivered to the medical team at Fannami Gubio Camp, pending the establishment of a dedicated camp clinic.

These efforts aim to improve the living conditions of IDPs and address immediate needs effectively.

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
